A Special Season at Old Westbury Gardens

As a vital piece of Long Island's past, Old Westbury Gardens has always been dedicated to bringing history to life. Thousands of guests visit Westbury House and the grounds every year to step back in time and experience the beauty and historical significance of Old Westbury Gardens. The First World War played a key role in our nation's story and has a history rooted deep in Old Westbury Gardens. John S. Phipps, son of steel magnate Henry Phipps, was a Captain in the U.S. Army Air Service during World War I and dedicated himself to helping raise funds to support the war effort. He served alongside other Long Island soldiers, laborers, and volunteers who aided in the war effort.

To commemorate the centennial anniversary of the end of the war, Old Westbury

Gardens will feature two exhibits throughout the 2018 season. The first, opening on March 31st, is The Volunteers: Americans Join World



War I, 1914-1919 is a special exhibition on loan from the National World War I Museum and Memorial in Kansas City, MO. Many volunteer groups throughout the country, especially on Long Island, helped provide labor, food, entertainment, and physical support to the Allied forces. These efforts are displayed and remembered in this exhibit, where you can see how groups including the American Field Service and the YMCA played a vital role in the war.

The main World War I exhibit at the Gardens this season, opening on June 23, is The Great War: Portraits of Privilege, Duty, and Sacrifice, which introduces events leading up to the war, responses of Americans prior to declaring war on Germany, and the subsequent mobilization of social institutions, human labor, and popular will-particularly on Long Island. Old Westbury Gardens' dedicated World War I exhibit will feature photographs, letters, and a variety of historic artifacts showcasing the loyalty, service and sacrifice of Long Island families who participated in the war effort. For the first time in its history, Old Westbury Gardens is able to share archive records including some of the most compelling stories of the war effort.

Old Westbury Gardens is also inviting members and guests to participate in telling Long Island's story, welcoming guests' personal artifacts and stories from family members who participated in the war effort. In addition, the Gardens will be hosting a Garden Faire and Gymkhana on June 23-24, paralleling the spirit of the Phipp's fundraising efforts with World War I reenactors, horse demonstrations, period vehicles and activities for audiences of all ages. Horticulture



South Allée Restoration

This February, work began on the third and final phase of our South Allée Restoration. This project has included the removal and replacement of over a half mile of Canadian Hemlock and Flowering Dogwood. The hemlock hedge, which was designed to frame the South Lawn and provide a vertical axis



down to our South Gates, is one of the character-defining features of our landscape. Over time, however, the hedge had grown out of scale with the surrounding landscape and had become irreparably damaged in places. The Flowering Dogwoods, which were meant to create a beautiful cloud of blossoms hovering over the hedge, had also declined or were lost.

Visitors to the gardens these past few years will have seen completed the first and second phases of this project. However, the final phase of the restoration is likely to be the most startling to guests. The hedge, over time, had grown to over twice the height of the original design and had been maintained at this larger height for more than twenty years. The hedge, which historical pictures show was maintained at a height of approximately nine feet, will once again allow for glimpses of the Thatched Cottage, specimen trees, and even parts of the Rose Garden. The view may be different from the one that our guests have grown accustomed to seeing, but it will be much closer to the one the Phipps family enjoyed for more than three decades.
