Going Back in Time with Portraits of the Great War

Preservation and education are at the heart of Old Westbury Gardens' mission, and the inspiring force behind the launch of this year's World War I Centennial exhibit. To commemorate the 100 year anniversary of the armistice of World War I, Old Westbury Gardens is holding a series of unique exhibits and welcoming a wide variety of history experts throughout the 2018 season.

The Gardens main exhibit, The Great War: Portraits of Privilege, Duty, and Sacrifice showcases Long Islanders' heroic contributions to the war effort, and for the first time in its history Old Westbury Gardens is able to share a selection of its own archival records of World War I



Reliving the Letters from Our Past

Old Westbury Gardens' extensive archives comprise one of Long Island's most important historical assets. The collection is rich in primary source documents of enduring historical value, bringing to life the story of this great estate.

The unique records, dating from 1860 to 1958 transport us back to the social, cultural, and business activities of the heyday of the American country estate. The Archives include fascinating historical information about Henry Phipps, John Schaffer Phipps, Margarita Grace Phipps, their immediate families and the staff who worked at Old Westbury Gardens. Over 8,000 pieces of correspondence, 2,000 photographs and films and 15,000 items chronicle events of the day, and the development and management of the Phipps estate. Irreplaceable blueprints, sketches and specifications are invaluable tools in the restoration of Westbury House, landscape design and the estate's signature features.

In order to protect these irreplaceable materials for future generations, Old Westbury Gardens is working with professional preservationists and archivists. The Archive Project will ultimately provide for documentation, cataloguing and digitization for the benefit of future scholarship. Horticulture

Spring Blooming

Looking out at the landscape, it's difficult to believe it is the end of April. Although the few warm days we had last week did help to advance things in the Garden, the plants still look more like they normally would in late March.

The cool temperatures have not been the only trouble we have had to contend with, however. The heavy snowfalls coupled with the wind in the late winter were extremely damaging to the landscape. More than twelve trees were lost and many more had to be pruned due to torn limbs. Even the evergreens, whose conical shape help them to shed snow, were affected by the season's latest weather events.

It's difficult to tell at this time what this means for the spring bloomers. If we have a few unseasonably warm days, then nature's clock will once again be set to the correct time. But, if the unusually cool days continue then we may very well have lilacs blooming on Memorial Day! What we can say with certainty is that each season is different and while this is one of the harshest in memory, it is not the worst this landscape has weathered in its one hundred and twelve winters.





Gardeners' Fair

Old Westbury Gardens looks forward to hosting our lively Gardeners' Fair benefit party on Saturday, May 19th. Kristina and Harry Davison have graciously agreed to serve as event chairs for this signature spring event. They have created an inspiring theme "Welcome to Harry's Bar, An Evening in Post



War Paris!" that echoes the Gardens' efforts this season to commemorate the armistice of WWI and acknowledge the contributions of many families from the Long Island community who were critical to the allied victory.

Harry Davison's grandfather, F. Trubee Davison, along with his undergraduate Yale classmates including his younger brother Henry Jr., established the first Yale Air Unit, nicknamed The Millionaires' Unit by the New York press. The Millionaires' Unit became the founding squadron of the WWI U.S. Naval Air Reserve and they were among the first that were called upon to enter naval combat operations when the U.S. entered the war.

During the war years in Paris, the American ambiance at Harry's Bar attracted a growing population of American soldiers, first as volunteers like the flyers of the Lafayette Escadrille, and then as part of the massive deployment in 1918 under General John Joseph "Black Jack" Pershing. Members of the The Millionaires' Unit were known to frequent Harry's Bar and enjoy a French 75, a mix of champagne and gin. The combination was said to have such a kick that it felt like being shelled with the powerful French 75mm field gun. We hope you will join us at this year's Gardener's Fair and be part of this journey back in history.
