# Role of Long Island's Business and Political Leaders during the Great War: Richard Welsh

Sunday, October 7, 2pm

Guest Curator for the Garden's WWI exhibit, Richard Welsh, will lead a lecture on the role of Long Island's business and political leaders during the Great War. He will discuss the prominent families on Long Island and their support of the war effort, some of these families include: The Davidsons, Roosevelts, Hitchcocks, and Bacons.

A Long Island native, Richard F. Welch received his doctorate in American history from Stony Brook University. He taught United States History, Western Civilization, Irish History and American Military History at Long Island University and Farmingdale State College. Dr. Welch's work has appeared in the Long Island Historical Journal, Journal of the American Revolution, America's Civil War, Civil War Times, Military History, American History and the New York Times. He is also the author of five books including *The Boy General. The Life and Careers of Francis Channing Barlow*, and *General Washington's Commando*.

# Men, Women, and Social Change in World War I: Libby O'Connell

Sunday, October 21, 2pm

For those who want to learn about the social changes as a result of the U.S.'s participation in the Great War, come join a presentation by Dr. Libby O'Connell.

The Great War transformed forever the lives of millions in many ways. In a significant way the conflict and the role of civilians led to new perspectives on gender roles in Western countries like the United States. For example, the long-standing debate about the proper role of women in modern democratic society was raised to a new level during the Great War. Women's wartime efforts, particularly their volunteer work and entries into the medical and social services validated their accomplishments as actively engaged citizens, thus pushing the agenda of equal rights and the vote for women.

Libby O'Connell formerly oversaw corporate and educational outreach for A+E Networks, including History Channel, A&E, H2, and FYI, and served as Chief Historian for the History Channel. Dr. O'Connell produced on site films for organizations such as the Smithsonian, Ellis Island, and Gettysburg, which History donates as part of its commitment to corporate citizenship. 

She currently serves on several boards including the Thomas Jefferson Foundation at Monticello, the Smithsonian's Center for Folklife and Cultural Heritage, and National History Day. In 2013, the White House appointed her as a commissioner on the National World War I Centennial Commission.

# Harlem's Rattlers and the Great War: The 369th Regiment: Jeffery Sammons

Sunday, November 4, 2pm

In this lecture, Jeffery Sammons will discuss the book he coauthored Harlem's Rattlers and the Great War: The
Undaunted 369th Regiment and the African American Quest
for Equality. The story captures the mythic status of the
Harlem Rattlers, the African-American combat unit that grew
out of the 15th New York National Guard, who were said to
have never lost a man to capture or a foot of ground that had
been taken. This new study points to a truth: more than
fighting to make the world safe for democracy, the black men
of the 369th fought to convince America to live up to its
democratic promise. It is this aspect of the storied regiment's
history-its place within the larger movement of African
Americans for full citizenship in the face of virulent racismthat Harlem's Rattlers and the Great War brings to the fore.

Jeffrey T. Sammons is an American historian and professor. He graduated from Bridgeton High School in New Jersey and earned his Bachelor of Arts degree in history from Rutgers College. He graduated magna cum laude and was elected to the Phi Beta Kappa honor society. Three years later, Sammons graduated from Tufts University with his Masters degree in history. After earning various fellowships, he graduated from the University of North Carolina with his Ph.D. in American History. Jeffery Sammons has taught at Princeton University and Hollins College, and now works as a professor of History at New York University.


